The Camp Fire Girls of America

The Camp Fire Girls organization was formed in 1910 jointly by Mrs. Charles Farnsworth, Thetford, VT and Dr. and Mrs. Luther Gulick, Sebago Lake, Maine. It was created to be a "sister" organization to the Boy Scouts of America. They were incorporated in 1912, and by 1913 there were over 60,000 members. Juliette Gordon Low formed the Girl Scouts of America in 1912 and was keen on merging the two organizations. The Camp Fire Girls was the larger of the two groups at that time and they rejected her offer.

According to The Book of the Camp Fire Girls (1913) the purposes of the organization were to see the beauty, romance and adventure in everyday life, to form habits for health and vigor, to have an outdoor spirit, to learn team work, to help girls and women serve the community and home, and to recognize the importance of motherhood and the relationship between mother and daughter. Membership was open to any girl twelve years and older. She could apply for membership at any local Camp Fire group. Many groups were sponsored by churches. Zion Episcopal Church in the Village of Wappingers Falls sponsored a Camp Fire. The meetings were held once a month with games, folk dancing, story-telling and pantomime, cooking and housewifery and handicrafts. The Camp Fire's emblem was a symbol for the sun "the real source of light and warmth-life". The camp fire stood for home and outdoor life. The watchword was Wohelo - (Wo)rk, (He)alth and (Lo)ve. Each girl selected her own unique Native American name. The owner of the Camp Fire Girls book in our archives, Anna (Hill) Baker, chose the tribal name "Anacaona". Her book, photos and pin were donated to the Historical Society by Dorothea L. (Baker) Kettler in 1982.

During WWI, the Camp Fire Girls organization sold over \$1,000,000 in Liberty Bonds and 9,000 thrift stamps. Fifty-five thousand members helped support French and Belgian orphans, who came to the United States as refugees, by offering babysitting services. At home, growing a garden and canning the yield was a highly encouraged activity for all members. Over 70,000 gardens were planted across the country.

Camp Fire, as the organization is known today, has over 200,000 members and its programs emphasize camping and outdoor activities.

Sgt. Irving H. Clapp (1891-1961)




Pvt. Thomas E. Bradley (1896-1971)

Sgt. Clapp was born in the Village of Wappingers Falls and attended the Riverview Military Academy. After serving in World War I, he returned to Wappingers and married Anna Blythe. They had three children: Dorothy, Marjorie and Irving H. The family lived in the Clapp Mansion on Clapp Avenue. He made his career at the Prudential Life Insurance Company. Sgt. Clapp is buried at Wappingers Rural Cemetery.

Pvt. Bradley was also born in the Village and served during World War I. He married Matilda Weeks and had five children: Joseph, Thomas, Michael, Patricia and Rita. He was retired from IBM having been employed in the maintenance department. Pvt. Bradley is buried in St. Mary's Cemetery.

The Origin of the Name of the Hughsonville Hamlet

Hughsonville was named after the Hughson Family. William and Henry Hughson were brothers who were born in England and made their way to America as young men. Henry settled in what is now the Village of Wappingers Falls. William purchased a tract sometime before the American Revolution, south of the Village, between the Vail family land (now the land occupied by the first two houses at the northern intersection of Rte 9D and Old State Road), and to the north at Faulkner's Creek (roughly just below the intersection of Rte 9D and Middlebush Road). The land he purchased extended west, almost to the Hudson River. William had three sons: William (1763-1850), John (1766-1849) and Stephen (1782-1868). He was a Patriot and fought in Brinckerhoff's Regiment during the Revolution. His three sons married and raised their families in Hughsonville. Stephen is buried in the cemetery of the old Wappinger's Creek Presbyterian Church (est. 1840). John is buried in Middlebush Cemetery.




